INTRODUCTION:

Master Plan Reexam/NJ Transit/NJTPA

- A 35 question Survey was administered from Aug. 14 to Sept. 21
- 265 respondents including 247 residents
- Questions coordinated with NJ Transit Friendly Planning and NJTPA Complete Streets

Cannabis Survey


- Administered July 18 to August 18, 2022
- 282 Respondents were recorded, 88% of which were residents of the Borough

September 14, 2022 Public Outreach Meeting

- Attended by 33 residents, business owners, workers;
- Opportunity for public to exchange ideas with DMR, Borough, NJTPA, NJ Transit


MP REEXAM SURVEY: DEMOGRAPHICS AND RELATION TO DUNELLEN:

- 44.53% aged 35 to 49
- 14% younger than 35
- 11 owned a business in Dunellen
- 23% worked from home
- 27.17% worked outside of Middlesex County
- 9.06% worked in Dunellen, 4.15% worked in New York City
- 18 commute by train, 10 walk to work, the rest commute by automobile




OPINIONS ABOUT DUNELLEN, RE-EXAM PRIORITIES:


- Top Priorities: "Taxes", "Downtown", Schools

- Mentions in Written Section: Parking, cost of housing, traffic safety, and flood mitigation


DOWNTOWN USAGE

Q12 What would you like to see more of in downtown Dunellen?



Avenue and Bound Brook Road? (Plainfield to Middlesex Border). (Mixed use development is commercial/retail on the ground floor with apartments above)






SUSTAINABILITY, CONCERNS

Q17 What are the biggest concerns the Borough should consider over the next 10 years? (Select up to 5)




- Greatest Concerns: Taxes, Overdevelopment

- Lowest Concerns: Lack of parks, community events


INFORMATION AND TECHNOLOGY SYSTEMS:

Q14 Where do you get your information about community and programs? (Select all that apply)




Q19 What technological services would you like to see the Borough adopt / implement? (Select all that apply)



WALKING HABITS


- 70% walk at least once per week
- 90% drive primarily
- Biking, Scooters, and Bussing are uncommon
- <50% walk to the train station
- 34.88% walk their children to school
- 1/3 desire a jitney service
- Top Obstacles to Walking: Fear of being struck, poor sidewalks, crime/harassment
- Enhancing sidewalks and safety is the #1 priority



BIKING HABITS


- Half the participants do not bike







- Want to see pocket / pop up parks in warm seasons


CANNABIS SURVEY


- Most say

PUBLIC OUTREACH MEETING

TRAFFIC AND PARKING

- Top issue
- Speeding and lack of parking
- Anxiety about impact from redevelopment
- Want speed control, more enforcement
- Streets of concern are Madison Ave, Second Street, Bound Brook Road, North Ave and Washington Ave

SUSTAINABILITY

Want more green infrastructure for aesthetic and flood control

OTHER COMMENTS

- Designate Dunellen Theater as Historical Property
- Increase outdoor dining
- Enhance pedestrian safety
- Reduce illegal, overcrowded or unsafe rental apartments
- Expand Columbia park into Dunellen Station area

PRELIMINARY ANALYSIS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

ECONOMY AND DOWNTOWN REDEVELOPMENT

- Downtown should be a primary focus of Reexam
- Mitigate impact on parking, traffic, schools
- Some desired uses not permitted, limited permission retail, super markets
- Clearly define use terms, revisit permitted uses

TAXES

- Top concern
- Residents want improvements without tax increases
- Options: Shared services, zoning for non-residential, offset with cannabis revenues, other fees
- PILOTs result in more muni revenue but less school revenue

ENVIRONMENT

- Favorable toward sustainable / green improvements
- Flooding a major concern
- EVSE required to be addressed in Reexam
- What is the future of flood prone areas property buy-outs, zoning considerations, bulk and design standards
- Participate in CRS

TRAIN STATION

Not a priority – used by 6.82% of respondents, 11.4% of residents (ACS)

PRELIMINARY ANALYSIS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

WALKING, BIKING, TRAFFIC & PARKING:

- Safety and street design are top obstacles to biking
- Traffic, speeding and parking a major concern
- Reconsider parking ratios in Downtown Redevelopment Plan account for new, existing residents, new businesses, and train commuters
- Speed reduction
- Modernize parking meter systems
- · Sidewalk continuity enforce sidewalk construction requirement, establish sidewalk fund
- ADA accessible crosswalks
- Dedicated bike lanes

PUBLIC SERVICES:

- Schools a high priority tax burden, play facilities, capacity
- Digitize services like permit, complaint filing

CANNABIS

- Majority in favor
- Preference for retail, amenable to others
- Favored areas overlap with Downtown Redev. "Transition Areas"
- Amenable to closer to center of downtown
